The largest source of one-time emergency financial assistance in New York City is the Human Resource Administration (HRA). They provide "One Shot" assistance for many types of emergencies, including rental arrears, storage fees, utilities, and health/personal items, among others. In some instances they do require people to pay back the funds eventually. Please check to see whether the person you are working with qualifies for their assistance:

Homeless/Eviction Prevention Help

- <u>Many tenants across NYC now have a "right to counsel" for free legal representation</u> in Housing Court. The program is only available right now in certain zip codes and limited by household income.
